Personal Injury File Review Report

1. INTRODUCTION

This report aims to inform the Health & Safety Committee of the six monthly review of personal injury claims across NHS Wales for the period April to September 2019 and lessons learned in investigating these claims.

2. BACKGROUND

Personal injury claims legal representation across Wales is provided by Legal & Risk Services (L&RS) in Shared Services Wales. On a six monthly basis L&RS provide Health Boards with a presentation, attached as **Appendix 1**, an overview in terms of the management of personal injury cases and comparison across NHS Wales. In addition L&RS provide a learning lessons newsletter, attached as **Appendix 2**.

3. GOVERNANCE AND RISK ISSUES

3.1 Personal Injury Profile

Across NHS Wales personal injury claims have been reducing and during the six month period L&RS have reported a saving of £1,395,545.27 in relation to successfully defending claims and negotiating reductions in settlements.

On an all Wales basis the highest number of claims open relate (slide 2) to:

- Falls 142 of which 21 (15%) relate to Swansea Bay University Health Board "SBUHB" claims;
- Violence & Aggression 134 of which 24 (18%) relate to SBUHB claims and;
- Defective Equipment 91 of which 21 (23%) relate to SBUHB claims.

Number of cases for falls, violence & aggression, defective equipment, estates management, needle stick cases and manual handing the general trend is falling over the last five years and this is the position for SBUHB as well (slides 7 - 14). However, work related stress cases across NHS Wales are more variable, although SBUHB's position is generally low numbers of cases over the years (slide 15).

3.2 Risks

If the Health Board does not ensure it has strong systems in place supporting effective health & safety management across the Health Board with documentary evidence to support then there is a risk that harm will be caused to patients and or staff and the health board's personal injury cases will increase with more successful outcomes.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Health Board pays the first £25,000 for each successful personal injury claim and the Welsh Risk Pool reimburse the Health Board for any financial settlement above

£25,000. The majority of personal injury claims settle including damages for a sum below £25,000 and therefore the Health Board bears the full financial liability of these cases.

Slide 17 shows the Health Board paid the most damages for any six month period during October 2016 to March 2017. Since that time and to September 2019 the Health Boards damages has been fairly consistent ranging from £85,626 to £106,877.
