# MENTAL HEALTH LEGISLATION COMMITTEE – TERMS OF REFERENCE (TOR) (INCORPORATING TOR FOR THE POWER OF DISCHARGE COMMITTEE)

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to provide an update on the review of the Terms of Reference (TOR) for the Mental Health Legislation Committee (MHLC), incorporating the TOR for the Power of Discharge Committee (PODC).

#### 2. BACKGROUND

## 2.1 Mental Health Legislation Committee

The 1983 Mental Health Act sets out procedures for detaining patients in hospital where that is necessary for their own health or safety, or the protection of other people. The Act also contains provision under which people may be subject to quardianship or be discharged from detention onto a community treatment.

The Mental Health Legislation Committee advises the Board of any areas of concern relating to responsibilities under Mental Health Legislation, and provide assurance that:

- statutory duties under the Mental Health Act 1983 (the Act) and subsequent amendments are exercised reasonably, fairly and lawfully, including the functions and processes of discharge under Section 23 of the Act
- provisions set out in the Mental Health Measure (Wales) are implemented and exercised reasonably, fairly and lawfully
- provisions set out in the Mental Capacity Act 2005 are exercised reasonably, fairly and lawfully.

It also ensures that other relevant legislation, particularly the Human Rights Act (1998), the Equality Act (2010) and Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards (DoLS) are also being fully adhered to for those people covered by Mental Health Legislation.

The Mental Health Legislation Committee discussed the need to review its Terms of Reference on the 8 August 2019 and it was agreed that they would be reviewed to reflect the good practice learnt on the Mental Health Legislation Training day provided by Blake Morgan Solicitors on the 30 July 2019.

The revised TOR have been updated to include:

- comments received from the Chair of the Mental Health Legislation
   Committee and the Mental Health Act Manager
- updated reference to the legislative and regulatory frameworks for Mental health
- Appendix 1 general housekeeping and guiding principles have been included from the Code of Practice
- Good practice identified on the Mental Health Legislation Training day provided by Blake Morgan Solicitors on the 30 July 2019, for example:
  - a scheme of delegation The Code of Practice requires (Chapter 37) that arrangements for who is authorised to take which decisions should be set out in a scheme of delegation. The Health Board is required to approve the scheme of delegation by a resolution of the body itself. Unless the Act or the regulations say otherwise, organisations may delegate their functions under the Act to any one and in any way that

their constitution or, in the case of NHS providers or NHS commissioners, NHS legislation allows them to delegate their other functions.

## 2.2 Power of Discharge Committee (PODC)

The 1983 Mental Health Act sets out procedures for detaining patients in hospital where that is deemed necessary either for their own health or safety, or the protection of other people. The Act also contains provision under which people may be subject to guardianship or be discharged from detention onto a Community Treatment Order (CTO).

The process for considering patients' discharge under the Act is delegated to the Hospital Managers Power of Discharge Sub-Committee (PODC) by the Mental Health Legislation Committee (MHLC). This Sub Group will meet on a quarterly basis to consider whether the discharge processes within the UHB are fair and reasonable and are being exercised lawfully

The 'Health Board' retains responsibility for the performance of hospital managers' functions exercised on their behalf under Chapter 37, and those delegated to Managers Panel Members under Chapter 38, and must ensure that the people acting on their behalf are competent to do so.

The Mental Health Legislation Committee discussed the need to review the Terms of Reference for the Hospital Managers PODC at its meeting on the 8 August 2019 and it was agreed that they would be reviewed in accordance with good practice for POD Committees in other Health Board's; and to reflect the good practice learnt on the Mental Health Legislation Training day provided by Blake Morgan Solicitors on the 30 July 2019.

The revised TOR have been updated to include:

- comments received from the Chair of the Hospital Managers PODC and the Mental Health Act Manager,
- updated reference to the legislative and regulatory frameworks for Mental health, including clarity on meetings being quorate, standards of behaviour and complaints.

## 3. GOVERNANCE AND RISK ISSUES

In accordance with the SBUHB Standing Orders, the Committee terms of reference are reviewed annually to ensure effective governance.

The Terms of Reference Welsh Government Mental Health 1983 Code of Practice for Wales¹ is provided as guidance to registered medical practitioners ('doctors'), approved clinicians, managers and staff of hospitals, and approved mental health professionals on how they should proceed when undertaking functions and duties under the Act. It also gives guidance to doctors and other professionals about certain aspects of medical treatment for mental disorder more generally. These people are required to have regard to the Code in carrying out their relevant functions under the Act. Departures from the Code could give rise to legal challenge and a court action, in reviewing any departure from the Code, the court will scrutinise

the reasons for the departure to ensure there is sufficiently convincing justification in the circumstances.

The Mental Health (Wales) Measure 2010 (the Measure)<sup>2</sup> is a unique piece of legislation designed to provide a legal framework to improve mental health services in Wales. Implementation of the services required by the Measure began, on a phased basis, in January 2012.
