
# Infection Prevention & Control Exception Report In Committee Quality and Safety meeting

## **INTRODUCTION**

This report provides the Quality & Safety Committee with an overview of the Heath Board response to the Increased Seasonal Influenza Activity experienced in Abertawe Bro Morgannwg University Health Board (ABMU HB) 2017/18

#### **BACKGROUND**

Influenza is a virus that can cause respiratory symptoms throughout the year, but generally the majority of Influenza infections circulate through the winter season, between the month of November and March. During the 2017/18 season, ABMU experienced 4 times more cases reported when compared to previous seasons. The increased burden of influenza in ABMU, particularly in relation to Secondary care admission, can be seen in the chart below.



To reflect on the Health Boards response to the influenza activity, and to improve our preparedness for the future, a formal structured debrief took place on the 9<sup>th</sup> of April

2018, at the Neath Port Talbot Resource Centre. The objectives were to learn from areas of good practice and lessons identified during the response. The full debrief report provides recommendations based on what was learned and should be considered in future planning. Attached as **Appendix 1.** 

#### **GOVERNANCE AND RISK ISSUES**

The report highlights the need for each Service Delivery Unit to have a contingency plan in place that clearly outlies actions to follow in the event of an increase in influenza admissions. This should include Leadership and consistent application of influenza risk assessment of all patients presenting to emergency/ assessment/admission units, separate waiting areas for potential cases and a dedicated Cohort ward.

## FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Introduction of local testing for Influenza provided a more timely result. The confirmed result influenced the appropriate prioritisation of single room utilisation and also allowed the clinician to adjust individual case management and also the management of other patient groups. This service was provided at an additional cost to the Health Board.

Additional staff resources were required to maintain patient flow and to support clinical areas respond to the increased activity.
